Questions for Reflection

- 1.1 Br. Peter cites historical and present-day examples of Viatorians living out these theme. What Viatorian ministries resonate with you as you hear about them?

- 3.3 We need to opt for marginalized people in our social actions. What is one way you could organize a social group or organization to which you belong in order to do this?
